Forklift License Saskatchewan - Within North America, getting a forklift license or forklift certification involves classroom and hands-on training. Regulatory control over training, licensing and certification for powered industrial truck operators falls under the jurisdiction of federal, state and provincial groups. Operators could get a license either through training administered by the employer or by a third party. Regardless, regulatory requirements should be met. Recertification is required every two to three years.

Forklifts are powered industrial trucks which come with various alternatives, like sit-down and stand-up. There are various sizes and types of forklift suitable for various industrial applications. Operator training courses are usually individualized to be able address the particular uses and types for which the operator is training. Training on a gas-powered, sit-down forklift inside a warehouse setting would not be the same as training on a stand-up, propane-powered forklift within a shipyard. The different lift trucks and their applications makes it impossible to establish universal licensing requirements for all machines and businesses. Regulatory standards, hence, tend not to concentrate on detailed program requirements but instead on the outcome of individual training courses.

Employer-provided, on-the-job training is the most common method for operators to obtain their forklift license or certification. This method of certification needs the employer to provide classroom sessions and practical training on machinery in the workplace. Employers could opt to train workers on each and every type of forklift separately, or to train them on all machines combined. The program incorporates forklift operation methods, safety measures, company policies and lift truck maintenance. Topics particular to the worksite, such as dangerous conditions or materials, must be covered. Following classroom learning, operators are taught how to safely operate and utilize each and every kind of lift truck on the worksite.

Certification through a third-party vendor usually needs an on-site component together with hands-on practice.

It must be noted that certifications provided by an employer do not transfer from one employer to the next. Obtaining a lift truck license through employer-provided training enables the operator to operate a forklift for that particular employer only.

The most significant factor of lift truck license training is forklift safety. The exact safety training requirements vary from one kind of machine to another. Safety problems vary from employer to employer, and from industry to industry. Both third-party providers and employer-provided training might have to deal with extra requirements for safety training in applicable industries, like for instance in offshore and marine operations.
